GUCCI MANE



Let's start things off with someone who I wouldn't say I look up to, but I appreciate what he does and I respect the career choices he's made: the one and only Gucci Mane of course. For you old white folk who don't quite recall who Gucci Mane might be, let me just refresh your memory. Gooch is an American rapper from Atlanta who started the Brick Squad label, which has covered many rappers from Waka-Floka to Chief Keef. His debut album was *Trap House*, released in 2005, and he's been in the mainstream media ever since. Now I am not sure what it is that I find so attractive about Gooch, but he oozes this aroma of swagger wherever he goes, and his music contains such a level of flow that you can't not like it. THE ATL TWINS



Now that we have scratched the surface with Gucci Mane. I can start to uncover some of the people that I have put more of my time and effort into researching, because they relate more to the character I have created, and because they hold features that are more interesting to me. Meet Sidney and Therman Sewell, a pair of go-get-em twins from Chattanooga, Tennessee, now all grown up: people know them well as the "ATL Twins." What sets these twins apart from other regular twins is that they see themselves as one person in two different bodies—they sleep together, have sex with the same women, and the longest they have ever been apart was 6 hours. There are a handful of people who absolutely despise the sight of these twins—they see them as uneducated, flashy, materialistic people who just waste their life and make themselves look stupid.³ The twins respond with these hateful comments with the truth: they own up to being materialistic, and they see nothing wrong with that. They aren't looking for any spiritual enlightenment—if anything they have already found it within each other. Rather, they are just looking to party and bang beautiful bodacious models all their life. From many sources that personally know the twins, people claim that they have never met a nicer, more real set of people in their entire life, because the twins grew up in a place where they had to learn how to be skillful in dealing with people. When they were little, they wouldn't really attend school; they would just skate, because that's what they wanted to do. LUKE GLANTON



Let me introduce you to Luke Glanton. Granted, Luke is the one character on this list that is actually fictional, but he might be my favorite. He's character played by Ryan Gosling in the film "The Place Beyond the Pines." Luke is a blonde, motorcycle-driving, bank-robbing badass who messes with no one and knows exactly what he wants. With these combined characters, I wanted to create my dream boy, the protagonist in my own story: Magnus. It wasn't easy—I could possibly have ended up with someone with conflicting morals and no appealing argument, which is definitely something I didn't want.

MAGNUS RONKO

All right, meet Magnus. Magnus is a 17-year-old white redneck, hailing from West Virginia, now residing in the Napa Valley, California. I have decided to shoot a documentary on Magnus because I haven't found a more interesting young boy. He doesn't seem to report to any law officials, or respect the authority of any of them whatsoever. He refuses to go to school because he hates being told what to learn. He chooses to teach himself within his own time by reading books or magazines, but he greatly prefers magazines. He enjoys reading *New York Times* articles because they are vastly informative, but also because he feels they make him look more sophisticated. Magnus is one of the more interesting boys I have stumbled upon in my travels—he comes from a wealthy family, but he rejects any thing that he is entitled to. In fact, he says he often doesn't go home for days at a time, and just sleeps under a bridge or some random vacant house. He claims that he doesn't appreciate people who just have everything handed to them; he'd rather just have nothing than have people give him anything he wants. I'm not quite sure

how I would explain Magnus in words, because he's such a contradicting specimen that it doesn't make sense when verbalized. He values many things like religion, science, self image, and bees no doubt, yet he allows himself to do such corrupt actions like tricking and convincing a medical specialist that he is a desperate orphan who has just broken his ankle and is in need of oxycontin, then proceeds to sell the oxycontin to local hikers in the city's forest. Despite Magnus's high moral code, there are darker parts of his life that he tries to refrain from. For example, growing up he admired his mother, but spent far too much time with his father for his comfort. His father worked at a mill during the day, but at night was a supporting member of a KKK group. His father, almost always drunk with rage and racist attitudes, would force Magnus to come to the gatherings of this group. Although young, Magnus did not feel right discriminating against black people, although he still wasn't entirely sure what that meant. Being young and small, Magnus was bullied often in school, causing him to look up to the strong masculine figure his dad had become. As he aged, Magnus realized how wrong racism was, but still holds subtle key traits of racism every now and then, always kept inside him like an everlasting, watching father.

The chances of it actually gaining publicity and significance in the eyes of any media are slim to none, but I think it's worth a shot.
